Friday 16th September – Sunday 18th September 2022

On Friday 16th September 2022, hundreds of people funnelled into Mukinbudin from near and far to celebrate the Centenary. The Centenary marks 100 years since the townsite of Mukinbudin was first gazetted back in 1922.
